Last Sunday was the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time. This Sunday we will celebrate the feast of Christ the King - the last Sunday of the Church's year before Advent begins a new year. And so we sense that time is moving rapidly, especially in this busiest of half terms. I am currently preparing my speech for Presentation Evening, in which I will reflect on the activities and achievements of 2024-25. I know there will be lots to share - all positive, of course. When it comes to next year's speech I expect the 2025 Gym and Dance Display will get a mention. That was a highlight of last week and I must congratulate all who made it the success it was: the PE team, especially Ms Perry and Miss Turner; the students who were performers, choreographers, or part of the tech team; the Dragon's Apprentice teams, the staff who helped with setting up the hall, ticket sales, front of house, and of course the excellent staff dancers! 220 students were involved - that's one fifth of the student population, which is amazing. We have recruited a lovely group of new students into Year 12 this year, and many of them were here at Gym and Dance Display, as part of the Dragon's Apprentice teams. One such student commented the next day that she wished she'd come here from Year 7 as she'd found it so inspiring and thought our students were so lucky to have had that opportunity. It's thanks to so many colleagues that there is a wealth of extra-curricular and super-curricular opportunities at JFK. I am always grateful to colleagues for the extra efforts these require.

There are so many positive experiences in school, but not just one-off events. Each day when I am around and about the school I take delight in seeing students engaged in their learning and teachers sharing their expertise. However, our task of education goes beyond the curriculum and also necessitates the instilling of values and behaviours that are conducive to a peaceful, happy, harmonious community. We have made a concerted effort this year to highlight these aspects of what it means to be a JFK student, with a half-termly focus. This half term we are promoting the importance of communication skills, which include the best use of body language. A typical analysis suggests that 55% of the elements of verbal communication are related to body language, whilst only 7% are the words that are spoken. We are keen to help our students achieve their best in communication skills, especially when they may be challenged about a behaviour or when responding to staff instructions. Please do speak to your child(ren) about this subject and emphasise its importance.

Competition standards were high but our students excelled themselves producing dishes that the Chef judges said they would be happy to see on the menu in a restaurant. The brief was to prepare and serve within 2 hours, a two course healthy meal. Comprising of a main course and a dessert for 2 people, costing up to £20:00.

Main dishes: Pan fried sea bass with citrus- dressed broccoli, mushroom risotto, jollof rice with plantain and chicken alfredo

Desserts: Raspberry and lemon mousse with a pistachio and ginger shortbread. A chocolate tart, no bake strawberry cheesecake and a lemon drizzle cake.

At the end of the two hours the judges delivered their verdict that all students had excelled and produced some fantastic dishes declaring the winner as Ollie in 1st place and Anna in 3rd place. Ollie will now go on to compete in the regional finals in the New Year.

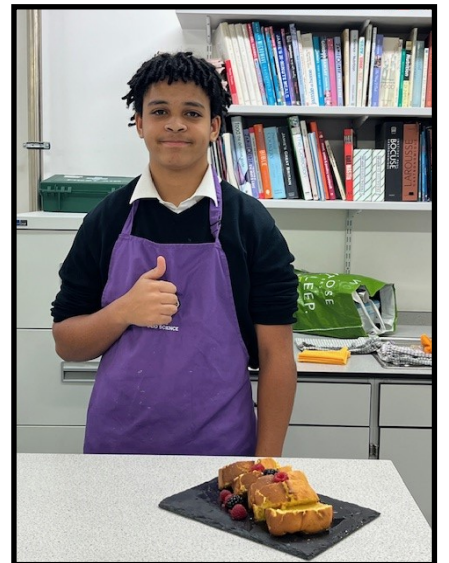
Well done to all the students involved, you were amazing and we are so proud of you all.

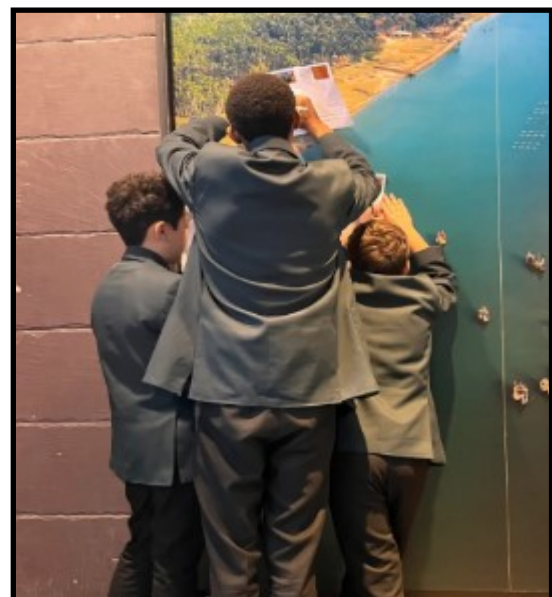
GEOGRAPHY

DIGITAL SAFETY



In today's digital world, apps are part of everyday life for secondary-age children. They offer creativity, entertainment, and social connection. However, alongside the positives come risks that parents and carers should be aware of.

Understanding the risks

Many apps collect large amounts of personal data, from location details to contacts, often without children realising the implications. Others expose young people to inappropriate or harmful content, whether through unfiltered videos, anonymous chats, or user-generated posts. Bullying and harassment can also take place within these platforms, sometimes hidden from parents and carers' view.

Another concern is the presence of online predators who may disguise themselves as peers in order to exploit children. On top of this, the design of many apps can encourage overuse through constant notifications and endless scrolling which can interfere with sleep, wellbeing, and school performance.

Financial risks also exist, with in-app purchases or "loot box" style features that can tempt children into spending money without fully understanding the consequences. Some apps may even appear harmless but are designed to hide conversations or bypass parental oversight, adding another layer of complexity for families.



DIGITAL SAFETY

What parents and carers should look out for

When your child asks to download a new app, it's worth considering a few key questions. What age is the app designed for?

- Does the rating match your child's stage of maturity?
- How much personal data does it request?
- Are the privacy settings easy to control?
- Does the platform have strong moderation and reporting tools?
- What is the community culture like?

You may also want to check how easy it is to make in-app purchases and whether parental controls are built in. Exploring these factors together with your child not only helps you assess the risks but also builds digital literacy, encouraging them to think critically about the online spaces they inhabit.

A trusted resource

To make this easier, **Internet Matters** has put together a clear, parent-friendly guide to the apps and platforms most commonly used by children today. It highlights what each app does, its key features, and the potential risks to be aware of.

This resource is regularly updated, so it's a reliable way to stay informed as new platforms emerge and existing ones evolve.

Practical steps you can take

The most effective safeguard is open communication. Ask your child what apps they use and why, and take time to explore those apps together. Set clear boundaries around screen time and "offline hours" such as at mealtimes or after bedtime. Encourage your child to block or report users who behave inappropriately, and make sure location sharing is switched off unless absolutely necessary.

Apps can be positive spaces where young people learn, create, and connect. But without awareness and guidance, they can also present real risks. By staying informed and keeping conversations open, parents and carers can empower children to use technology safely and responsibly.

ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS 2025

At John F Kennedy Catholic school, we believe that student performance, behaviour and attendance are fundamentally linked. Our ethos is to maximise the full potential of each student and in order to achieve this, high attendance rates are essential.

Our expectation is that individual student attendance should not be below 95%.

Section 7 of The Education Act states that 'parents are responsible for making sure that their children, of compulsory school age, receive a suitable full time education'.

Section 444 of The Education Act clearly states that 'if a child is absent without authorisation, then the parent is guilty of an offence'. This is a strict liability offence - i.e. all that needs to be shown is a lack of regular attendance. Sanctions can include a fine of up to £1000.

Holidays during Term time

Authorisation of absence for Holidays during term time is at the discretion of the Headteacher and is granted only in exceptional circumstances.

Fines are enforceable for a child being absent from school without permission. This is currently £80 per child for each parent, rising to £160 if paid after 21 days.

Lateness

As stated in the school Attendance Policy:

- Students should attend school "full time" and they should remain in school attending all timetabled lessons. This means that students should arrive in time for registration. In practice school buses may be late and in this case students should sign in at Reception so they can receive their mark.
- Avoidable lateness beyond 10.00 am constitutes unauthorised absence and can legally be the basis of an offence by the parent/carer
- Those students who arrive very late (after 10.00 am) without a good excuse will not be credited with an attendance. Their absence will therefore be unauthorised and a different mark (U) will be used to distinguish them from those who are "unpunctual". Steps will be taken by the school with the support of parents/carers to correct those students who are persistently unpunctual

The changes on which we are asking your opinion are:

- Criterion 2 applicants to provide a Certificate of Catholic Practice (CCP) to confirm children are practising Catholics
- Priority of siblings within criterion 7 - Catechumens and members of an Eastern Christian Church

Road Safety

Parents/Carers are reminded about the importance of road safety and we highlight a number of points you may wish to discuss with your child:

- The importance of crossing the road at a safe place. Using either a zebra or pelican crossing where possible

Appointments During School

Please try to avoid making medical appointments during the school day. If this is not possible, please alert the Year Team via email with a copy of the appointment letter/email/screenshot at least 24 hours in advance.

If your child does need to leave for a pre-arranged medical appointment please ensure that they are aware of the time and date of the appointment and are instructed to be ready in reception to be collected. There have been a number of occasions recently whereby the office staff have had to search for a student in order for them to be picked up.

Illness During the School Day

We have seen an increase in students calling parents prior to seeking medical attention at school. Any student feeling unwell during the school day should report to Student Services where they will be seen by a medically trained member of staff. Please do impress upon your children the importance of the school contacting home if it is required during the school day. It can cause parents unnecessary worry which we would like to avoid.

- Help your child to switch their device off.
- Support behaviour difficulties when playing.
- The effect of using devices as a reward or consequence.
- Teach children to develop their own methods of regulating device use and staying safe.
