Good Shepherd Sunday

The theme of the week is 'shepherd'. That's because last Sunday's Gospel reading contained an analogy of Jesus as a shepherd, guiding and protecting his sheep. The passage ends with a phrase that we in school are familiar with:

'I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full.'

This is the Gospel of John, chapter 10, verse 10. Ten:ten is the company, whose Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) resources we have used for many years at JFK. They are a Catholic organisation and have developed teaching resources for RSE that present a Catholic view and are faithful to the Church's teachings. They used to send a team into school to perform dramas based on the particular issues we were studying, followed by Q&A sessions, exploring the key themes and messages provided by Church teaching. Ten:ten are very clear about their view of these matters concerning relationships between our young people, and they have always provided a useful addition to the in-school provision.

We hear in the Gospel Jesus saying that 'anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate, but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. He goes on:

I am the gate of the sheepfold. Anyone who enters through me will be safe: he will go freely in and out and be sure of finding pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full.' What do we understand by this in relation to our students? It begins with the first word in our Mission Statement:

Inspire - to be Christian role models in their behaviour and their approach to school, demonstrating the Gospel values: honesty, kindness, forgiveness, love, in and out of the classroom

And continues...

Achieve - to be their best in every aspect of school life, by giving their full effort to every activity and demonstrating commitment, resilience and perseverance

Serve - to be mindful of those around them who need help and be willing to be of service, and to participate fully in the life of the school community.

If our students leave us with these guiding principles, they will surely enjoy an adult life that is lived to the full. We can easily be critical of people who don't take responsibility for their actions and just follow the crowd, but sometimes, in the right context, it's good to be a sheep!



STUDENT LEADERSHIP COMMISSIONING

Along with the idea of shepherding people in a community is the notion of leadership. Following our great tradition of student leadership, this week we commissioned our new student leaders:

- Our new Senior Student Leadership Team
- Our new House Captains
- Our new IAS Leaders.

This took place in a ceremony that marked the Feast of St Mark, the patron saint of our parish church, here at JFK, and of the ASCAT Hub of schools, here in Dacorum. The short liturgical service included a reading from scripture and a short reflection, prayers for the newly appointed leaders and thanks for those who have completed their term of office. It is so wonderful to see so many students gathered in order to be of service to the school community - something not many schools can replicate!

On this special Feast of St Mark we also awarded the prestigious 'St Mark Award' to students who have been recognised as superb role models in the community, particularly in living out the Catholic ethos of our school and making a consistent contribution to the school's Catholic Life and Mission.

Congratulations to the recipients of the St Mark Award and thanks to all those students who have volunteered to be of service to JFK in a special way!

MATHS

Maths Excellence: Kangaroo Competition Success

We are delighted to celebrate the outstanding achievements of four of our students in the prestigious UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Kangaroo competitions.

Jakub Matusz and Alessandro McKee (Year 11) both earned gold certificates in the Pink Kangaroo challenge and Stanley Pulis (Year 10) achieved a silver certificate in the same competition. Nasri Davidson-Ali (Year 9) achieved a silver certificate in the Grey Kangaroo challenge.

The Kangaroo competitions are follow-on rounds for high-performing students in the UKMT Intermediate Mathematical Challenge. The name acknowledges the Australian origins of the contest. The competitions feature complex problem-solving questions that test mathematical reasoning and creativity beyond the standard curriculum.

Students qualify for either the Pink or Grey Kangaroo based on their scores in the initial challenge, meaning our students had already demonstrated exceptional mathematical ability just to earn their place in these follow-on rounds. Certificates in the Kangaroo competitions are awarded based on students' scores, with the top 10% receiving gold, the next 20% silver and the next 30% bronze.

We are incredibly proud of all four students for their mathematical talent, and excellent performance. Qualifying for these competitions is an achievement in itself, and earning gold and silver certificates demonstrates truly exceptional ability. Well done to Jakub, Alessandro, Stanley and Nasri!

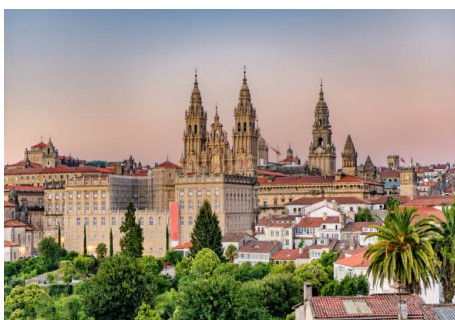

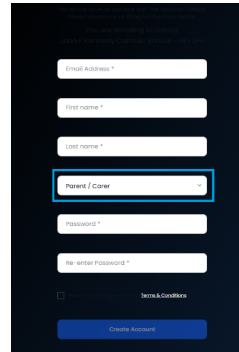

CYCLING SAFETY



Cycling to school is a great way for pupils to stay active and independent, but it's important that it's done safely.

We strongly encourage all pupils who cycle to wear a properly fitted helmet every day. Helmets can greatly reduce the risk of serious head injury in the event of a fall or collision.

It is important that:

- **The helmet fits snugly and sits level on the head**
- **Straps are fastened correctly every time**
- **The helmet is in good condition and has not been damaged in a previous fall**

Bicycles are designed for one rider only. Carrying passengers on handlebars, luggage racks, or the back of a bike is unsafe and affects balance and control. Pupils should be reminded not to carry friends and to make sensible decisions even if others encourage them to do so.

The roads close to school can become particularly busy at the beginning and end of the school day, with cars, buses, and pedestrians all sharing limited space. Pupils should ride sensibly, stay alert, follow road signs and signals, and clearly signal their intentions when turning. Pupils should not weave in and out of traffic or between vehicles, as this is dangerous, unpredictable, and greatly increases the risk of an accident. Distractions such as mobile phones or headphones should be avoided.

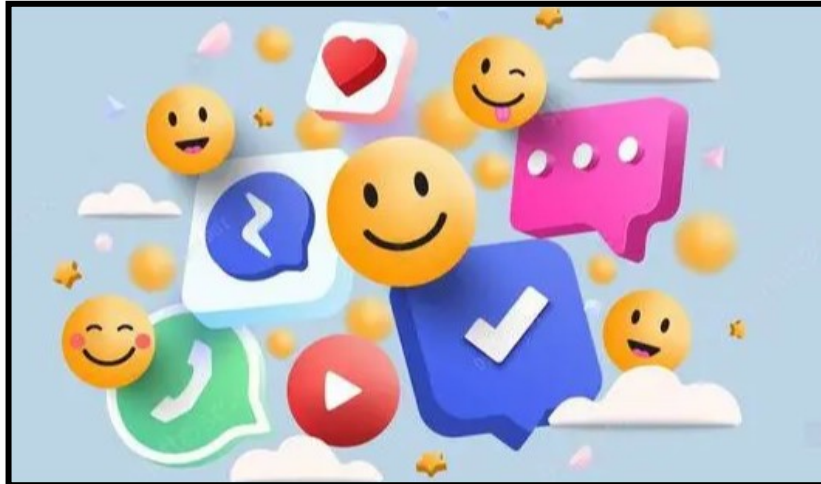
We ask that parents and carers to reinforce these messages at home and check that bikes are roadworthy, with working brakes, lights, and reflectors, especially during darker mornings and afternoons.

DIGITAL SAFETY



In today's digital world, apps are part of everyday life for secondary-age children. They offer creativity, entertainment, and social connection. However, alongside the positives come risks that parents and carers should be aware of.

Understanding the risks

Many apps collect large amounts of personal data, from location details to contacts, often without children realising the implications. Others expose young people to inappropriate or harmful content, whether through unfiltered videos, anonymous chats, or user-generated posts. Bullying and harassment can also take place within these platforms, sometimes hidden from parents and carers' view.

Another concern is the presence of online predators who may disguise themselves as peers in order to exploit children. On top of this, the design of many apps can encourage overuse through constant notifications and endless scrolling which can interfere with sleep, wellbeing, and school performance.

Financial risks also exist, with in-app purchases or "loot box" style features that can tempt children into spending money without fully understanding the consequences. Some apps may even appear harmless but are designed to hide conversations or bypass parental oversight, adding another layer of complexity for families.

DIGITAL SAFETY

What parents and carers should look out for

When your child asks to download a new app, it's worth considering a few key questions. What age is the app designed for?

- Does the rating match your child's stage of maturity?
- How much personal data does it request?
- Are the privacy settings easy to control?
- Does the platform have strong moderation and reporting tools?
- What is the community culture like?

You may also want to check how easy it is to make in-app purchases and whether parental controls are built in. Exploring these factors together with your child not only helps you assess the risks but also builds digital literacy, encouraging them to think critically about the online spaces they inhabit.

A trusted resource

To make this easier, **Internet Matters** has put together a clear, parent-friendly guide to the apps and platforms most commonly used by children today. It highlights what each app does, its key features, and the potential risks to be aware of.

This resource is regularly updated, so it's a reliable way to stay informed as new platforms emerge and existing ones evolve.

Practical steps you can take

The most effective safeguard is open communication. Ask your child what apps they use and why, and take time to explore those apps together. Set clear boundaries around screen time and "offline hours" such as at mealtimes or after bedtime. Encourage your child to block or report users who behave inappropriately, and make sure location sharing is switched off unless absolutely necessary.

Apps can be positive spaces where young people learn, create, and connect. But without awareness and guidance, they can also present real risks. By staying informed and keeping conversations open, parents and carers can empower children to use technology safely and responsibly.

ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS 2025-2026

At John F Kennedy Catholic school, we believe that student performance, behaviour and attendance are fundamentally linked. Our ethos is to maximise the full potential of each student and in order to achieve this, high attendance rates are essential.

Our expectation is that individual student attendance should not be below 95%.

Section 7 of The Education Act states that 'parents are responsible for making sure that their children, of compulsory school age, receive a suitable full time education'.

Section 444 of The Education Act clearly states that 'if a child is absent without authorisation, then the parent is guilty of an offence'. This is a strict liability offence - i.e. all that needs to be shown is a lack of regular attendance. Sanctions can include a fine of up to £1000.

Holidays during Term time

Authorisation of absence for Holidays during term time is at the discretion of the Headteacher and is granted only in exceptional circumstances.

Fines are enforceable for a child being absent from school without permission. This is currently £80 per child for each parent, rising to £160 if paid after 21 days.

Lateness

As stated in the school Attendance Policy:

- Students should attend school "full time" and they should remain in school attending all timetabled lessons. This means that students should arrive in time for registration. In practice school buses may be late and in this case students should sign in at Reception so they can receive their mark.
- Avoidable lateness beyond 9.10 am constitutes unauthorised absence and can legally be the basis of an offence by the parent/carer
- Those students who arrive very late (after 9.10 am) without a good excuse will not be credited with an attendance. Their absence will therefore be unauthorised and a different mark (U) will be used to distinguish them from those who are "unpunctual". Steps will be taken by the school with the support of parents/carers to correct those students who are persistently unpunctual

Road Safety

Parents/Carers are reminded about the importance of road safety and we highlight a number of points you may wish to discuss with your child:

- The importance of crossing the road at a safe place. Using either a zebra or pelican crossing where possible
- Avoid crossing behind parked cars
- Never run out into the road
- Be aware of your surroundings – take out earphones and stop talking with friends or on the phone when crossing the road
- Have reflective items on jackets or bag.
- If cycling, follow the same instruction and make sure you have lights on your bike and wear a helmet at all times.

Appointments During School

Please try to avoid making medical appointments during the school day. If this is not possible, please alert the Year Team via email with confirmation of the appointment letter/email/screenshot at least 24 hours in advance.

If your child does need to leave for a pre-arranged medical appointment please ensure that they are aware of the time and date of the appointment and are instructed to be ready in reception to be collected. There have been a number of occasions recently whereby the office staff have had to search for a student in order for them to be picked up.

Illness During the School Day

We have seen an increase in students calling parents prior to seeking medical attention at school. Any student feeling unwell during the school day should report to Student Services where they will be seen by a medically trained member of staff. Please do impress upon your children the importance of the school contacting home if it is required during the school day. It can cause parents unnecessary worry which we would like to avoid.

If your son/daughter is going to be absent due to illness please telephone the school absence line by 9.00am on each day of absence.

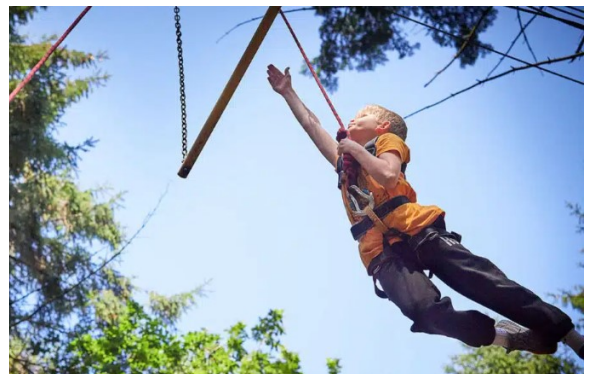
An Exclusive offer for our School Families PGL Kid's Camps
